What is naloxone?

- Naloxone (Narcan, Evzio) temporarily stops an opioid overdose by blocking its effects on the brain.
- Naloxone does NOT work for overdoses involving alcohol or non-opioid drugs such as stimulants or benzodiazepines.
- Naloxone is safe to use and unlikely to cause harmful effects even if given to someone who is not overdosing on opioids.

Why do I need it?

- Anybody taking an opioid has a potential risk of overdosing.
- An overdose can occur even with proper use.
- Opioids can slow or stop breathing, leading to loss of consciousness or death.

Signs of an opioid overdose: Cannot wake up Small or sliqua triognia Slow irregular Snoring or breaths or not gurgling breathing Blue lips or fingernails Body is limp

How to Respond to an Opioid Overdose



SHOUT & SHAKE Shout their name and shake their shoulders



CALL 9-1-1 If unresponsive



GIVE NALOXONE 1 spray into nostril or inject 1 vial or ampoule into arm or leg



PERFORM RESCUE **BREATHING AND/OR CHEST** COMPRESSIONS

IS IT WORKING? If no improvements after 2-3 minutes, repeat steps 3 & 4. Stay with them.

Injectable naloxone is easy to use and your pharmacist will train you when receiving your kit.

Naloxone nasal spray — Intranasal naloxone is for the nose.

It is easy to use and works even if you need to give it to a person who is not breathing.

How to give naloxone nasal spray:

- Peel the package open and hold the device. Do not press until ready to give naloxone.
- Place the nasal end in the nostril.
- Press plunger firmly to spray.

How to stay safe on opioid medications:

Do not drink alcohol.

Do not start any new medications without talking to your doctor, nurse practitioner, or pharmacist first.

Do not share medications.

Store medications in a safe and secure place.

Take your medications exactly as prescribed. If you have questions, ask your prescriber or pharmacist.

Who is eligible for a Naloxone kit?

- Anyone who is currently using opioids
- Anyone who is a past opioid user who is at risk of returning to opioid use
- Anyone who is a family member, friend or other person in a position to assist a person at risk of overdose from opioids

Where can I get Naloxone to save a life?

Stop by any of these Peace River Center sites, and ask for a free Narcan (naloxone) Nasal Spray kit. We will not ask your name or any personal information.
